A. Tuesday, February 11, 2025, Governing Board Regular Meeting Docket (Note: Open-Door Sessions postponed)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Item 12.2 Resolution – Sharon Sampson inquired whether the current District Services buildings would be available for Grossmont College to take over if the District finds a new off-campus location. It was noted that the spaces would be available, but that one of the District Services buildings will need to be demolished due to its poor condition. The funds for the purchase of property for District Services offices are part of Prop V bond funds.
B. New Health and Safety Committee – Update	<ul style="list-style-type: none">This new committee will be meeting on the 4th Thursday of the month, starting this month on 2/27.
C. Taskforce on Reimagining Public Safety <ul style="list-style-type: none">Proposal	<ul style="list-style-type: none">GCCCD is the only district in the region that does not have its own police department.Police departments are very expensive.Prior discussions took place with SDCCD regarding contracting with their police force, but concerns were raised by one of SDCCD's academic senates. We are considering revisiting the idea.Southwestern could also be considered for such a police sharing arrangement.CAPS is not in charge of public safety and does not have “policing” responsibilities in their department responsibilities or job descriptions. Rosie Ibarra clarified that CAPS does not respond to emergencies, but rather, they facilitate getting emergency services to the right place.Karen Marrujo appreciates that the District is taking a partnership approach to reimagining public safety.Perla suggested approaching SDSU as a possible public safety partner, as well.Colleen Moreno shared that many colleges in California are getting rid of their police forces and then regretting it. When they try to reestablish a police force, they are finding it much more expensive than before. She noted there is a trend towards more of a “guardian” philosophy rather than a “warrior” mentality in policing college campuses.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• The Chancellor emphasized that the proposal in the attachment includes CAPS, does not anticipate eliminating CAPS, and that no decision has been made to eliminate the sheriff's contract at this time.• There is significant anxiety in our community at this time, and expanded public safety coverage is important.• The Chancellor shared that the plan does not anticipate a cost savings.
D. Student Parking Fees – Revisited	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• The Chancellor summarized the discussion on this topic from the January 17 DEC meeting.• This topic will be discussed in more detail at the DBC meeting following this meeting.• The allowable parking fee has gone up to \$72. However, GCCCD will keep the cost at \$40 for next fall.• The grace period before beginning to cite for violations is 3 weeks.• Reduced cost permits at \$20 will still be available for qualifying students.
E. Governance Council Updates (Standing Item)	
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• IEPI Update	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Kerry Kilber-Rebman reported that a workshop was held with students on January 24th, and was very successful. The students were very engaged.• There is more work to be done on updating the Governance Handbook before it can be finalized.• Vi Huynh noted that he is very proud of his ASG board, and will keep encouraging student voices.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Kerry Kilber-Rebman reported on upcoming ACMM training. More information on ACMM can be found using this LINK.• The ACMM training provides instruction on how to follow the law and help students at all levels, and will conduct an assessment of the current state of our technology.• The Chancellor noted that the District agreed to the ACMM training now because the real work of making recommended changes comes after the training and assessment have been completed.• The ACMM process results in a systemic structure and framework so the District does the right things going forward.• The state does not charge for the ACMM training and assessment.• The need for establishing District and college resource contacts for accessibility issues was discussed.
