The Chancellor shall, in keeping with Board Policy <u>2410 and</u> 2510, establish procedures for Program and Curriculum Development at each college. <del>These procedures shall address:</del> <u>Each college shall follow the program and course approval process delineated in the Program and Course Approval Handbook published and regularly updated by the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office. College procedures shall be updated as necessary to attend to changes in state procedures and address, at minimum, the following:</u>

- Initiation, review, approval, and evaluation processes and related criteria
- Designated responsibility and authority for initiation, review, and approval of courses (e.g., the academic affairs office, academic senate, faculty, departments, related disciplines, divisions, curriculum committee, articulation officer, etc.)
- Time-lines and limits for the process
- Publication of changes and maintenance of records
- Use of a range of delivery systems and modes of instruction

The District shall develop and offer programs and curricula in ethnic studies, programs and curricula that infuse a global perspective into the curricular offerings, and programs and curricula that include instruction from the perspectives of persons from historically marginalized groups with low socioeconomic status in the topic from historically and currently marginalized groups in the topic.

The District shall provide annual certification to the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office pertaining to the approval of credit courses and credit programs as required under Title 5 Sections 55100 and 55130.

## **Credit Hour**

One credit hour of community college work (one unit of credit) shall require a minimum of 48 semester hours of total student work or 33 quarter hours of total student work, which may include <a href="hours">hours</a> inside <a href="hours">and/or outside-of-class</a> hours. A course requiring 96 hours or more total student work shall provide at least 2 units of credit. Cooperative <a href="hours">wW</a> or kexperience <a href="hours">education</a> courses shall adhere to the formula for credit hour calculations identified in Title 5 Section <a href="hours">55256.5</a> <a href="hours">hours</a> <a href="hours">hours</a>

based education modules shall adhere to the formula for credit hour calculations identified in Title 5 Section 55270.12. Credit for clock hour designed programs shall be awarded consistent with 34 Code of Federal Regulations Part 600.2

The District shall assess credit hours as follows:

To determine the Units of Credit for a course, the District will utilize the formula: (Total Contact hours + Outside-of-Class Hours) / Hours-per-unit Divisor = Units of Credit.

- The Course Outline of Record (COR) shall indicate the In-Class Course head outside-of-Class Hours, and the Total Student Learning Hours.

The District awards credit in increments of 0.5, and the minimum credits allowed for a course are 0.5. For example, a course may be 2.5 units, but no course can be less than 0.5 units in total. When increments are utilized, the College cannot award credits unless the total student learning hours have reached the minimum threshold for that number of units. If application of the aforementioned formula resulted in 3.33 units of credit, the highest number of units the College would award for the course is 3.0. In order to reach 3.5 units, the College would need to adjust the hours for the course.

Every course, when reviewed through the curriculum process, will have the hours and units verified for state and federal regulation compliance.

For <u>Title IV</u> purposes <u>and of</u> federal financial aid eligibility, a "credit hour" shall be not less than:

- One hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately 15 weeks for one semester, or the equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time; or
- At least an equivalent amount of work as required in the paragraph above of this definition for other academic activities as established by the institution, including laboratory work, internships, practica, studio work, and other academic work leading to the award of credit hours.

Additional assessment and completion of special forms may be required for enrollment in certain District programs.

Students shall be classified at the time of registration as a resident or non-resident student. Resident classification shall be <u>in</u> accordance with <u>the</u> California Code of Regulations and shall be published in each college's catalog.

The Governing Board shall provide procedures that allow for admission of special fulltime or part-time students who may benefit from advanced scholastic or occupational work as set forth in Education Code Sections 48880 and 76000.

The Chancellor shall establish procedures regarding compliance with statutory and regulatory criteria for concurrent enrollment.
