The colleges within the Grossmont-Cuyamaca Community College District (GCCCD) administer their intercollegiate athletics programs in accordance with the rules and regulations adopted by the California Community College Athletic Association (CCCCA) and all applicable conferences. The CCCCCA Constitution and Bylaws can be found on the Internet.

As a multi-college district each institution will adhere to CCCCCA Bylaws ~~1.9.1 and 1.9.2~~, which governs student-athlete eligibility for those students who participate in intercollegiate athletics and attend one or both institutions. In addition to the aforementioned Bylaws, student-athletes will also be subject to CCCCCA Bylaw 1.10.1 as it relates to the transfer from one institution to another in a multi-college district when both colleges sponsor the same sport. To become eligible the student-athlete must complete 12 units in residence (only 8 units from summer) at the other institution before becoming eligible to participate.

In addition to the student-athlete eligibility requirements found in the CCCCCA Constitution and Bylaws, student athletes must observe GCCCD Standards of Conduct which are found in BP/AP 5500 Standards of Student Conduct.

Each Athletic Director will conduct an annual in-service for all Athletic Department staff no later than the last Friday in August.

Each student-athlete meets annually with Athletics Department staff to review applicable rules and policies.

Compliance

Each Athletic Director annually completes the Statement of Compliance, Title IX Gender Equity (Form R4) and maintains the report in the Athletics Department.

At least once within every five (5) years, the CCCCCA and the Pacific Coast Athletic Conference (PCAC) conducts a Program Review of each college's athletic department.

Every October each Athletic Director will complete and submit a mandatory Federal survey (the Equity in Athletics Disclosure Act of 1994) to the U.S. Department of Education.

The Athletic Director is delegated authority from the supervising Vice President ~~for Student Services~~ for developing, implementing, and monitoring the foregoing procedures.
