## Districtwide Phone Notice: Calling 911

With the implementation of the new phone system, it is no longer necessary to dial (9) before dialing 911. Your call to 911 will automatically occur.



With this change, we have seen an increase in several accidental phone calls to 911 when attempting to dial an outside line.

**PLEASE DO NOT HANG UP.** Explain that it was an accident so that 911 does not have to call you back or track down a phantom incident. This will allow them to concentrate on live emergency calls.
